A greeting from the Headmaster

Forty years since our first Ashburton Shield victory is an opportune time to celebrate, and indeed reflect on, the significance of great achievement at Epsom College. The generations of shooters who came before the historic win of 1973, as well as those who followed and current members of the team, can be proud to have contributed to one of the most distinguished areas of our history. We are honoured that Lord Ashburton is taking part in this celebration.

The Ashburton Shield competition was established in 1861 by the 3rd Lord Ashburton, Francis Baring, when Epsom College, or the Royal Medical Benevolent College as it was then known, was less than a decade old. In 1880 the Rifle Corps was established with 40 members, a band and a shooting team but it was not until 1908 when its first indoor range had been built that the College would enter the Ashburton. After World War II, with the completion of the miniature range in 1929 and an outdoor range in 1939, the College began to come of age as a shooting school. In 1950 Epsom won the Country Life, Schools' Aggregate and the Cadet Pair, and were runners-up in the Ashburton.

Today, the CCF has more than 400 members with a shooting team that holds the record for the highest number of Ashburton wins by a single school. What is perhaps even more remarkable are the successes that Old Epsomians have gone on to achieve nationally and internationally and the expertise and knowledge they have so willingly shared with students for generations.

It is through experiences such as these that we raise the aspirations and abilities of our students, which gives us ample cause for celebration.

The Early Years

y memories of shooting at the College begin in 1946 when 'Sammy' Weare commanded the JTC (as the CCF was then known) and instruction was handled by RSM Langridge, ex Grenadier Guards. Training was conducted on strictly military lines: Pokey Drill to strengthen our wrists (no slings in those days), which meant swinging the rifle in alternate hands; and dry firing at each other, lying on the ground with one looking through a hole in a small metal replica target and the other firing at it.

We had SMLEs (Short Model Lee Enfields), which had a blade foresight and an U backsight situated just forward of the breech. This was a short metal bar hinged at the muzzle end and raised and lowered by a slide which when pushed forward would raise the rear end – no adjustment for wind, one aimed off.

Our first No4s had the slightly longer barrel and a 'peep' aperture rearsight, mounted over the bolt. It could be laid flat when not in use and flipped up when needed. It was graduated in 100 yard intervals and was raised or lowered by a slide with a clip at the side. Later on we had flip sights with a vertical screw adjustment, which we used for the Ashburton in 1949. Not having a wind gauge adjustment meant we had to aim off for wind.

Until 1946, we used the open 30 yard


range where the Armoury is today. Following the War, shooting recommenced at Bisley, travelling down in hired buses with wooden slatted seats. The rifles were stacked on the floor at the rear of the bus and every time we went over a bump they jumped in the air and crashed down – good for accuracy!

For the Schools' Meeting, we slept in circular army bell tents, which took eight to ten cadets lying on ground sheets with feet pointing towards the centre pole. The tent opened with a vertical slit from the top, which could be laced shut. The rule was to NEVER

SLEEP UNDER THE SLIT as you were guaranteed a soaking if it rained!

The ablutions were basic military – no doors or privacy anywhere, although I do remember unsuccessful attempts to hang hessian on the front of the WC cubicles.

When we finished our shoot, the rifle had to be cleaned by pouring six pints of boiling water down the barrel held over a bucket on a gas ring in the Surrey Armoury. The barrel was then dried and oiled using a 'pull through' with a brass weight at one end and flannelette tucked into a loop at the other.

My first visits to Bisley were during 1949 with Sydney Weare, from whom I then took over as Master i/c Shooting. In 1950 Epsom came second in the Ashburton and won the Country Life, Schools' Aggregate, and the Cadet Pair. Though clearly not responsible, this success reinforced my commitment. Still more so in 1952 when we were one point away from Ashburton victory and

again winning the Country Life at 500 yards.

For more than 20 years, when sometimes 100 schools filled Century Range, Epsom competed with success in many events, just short of the Ashburton itself but six times in the top five, and showing our strength in the Schools' Aggregate, won six times between 1950 and 1962.

1973 was our first Ashburton win. Seven members of the VIII had shot in the 1972 team, from which only the Captain had left. In those days there were no supporters from the College – or perhaps a few OEs on their

way to the Veterans. But in 1973 there was one notable exception — Brigadier Glyn Hughes, Member of Council and Treasurer, most distinguished OE, former Head of School and Captain of Shooting, sat alone on his shooting stick throughout the afternoon. How could he have known this was the year to attend? Delighted with the result, he hosted a champagne celebration with the team in the Middlesex — so I was told, being involved fighting the Bisley phones, passing the news back to the College. Some days later came Keith Pilcher's second win in the Queen's Prize — placing him firmly in the NRA's history books.

Undoubtedly, Epsom's successes before and after 1973 resulted largely from the coaching talents of HJ 'Tommy'Thomas, Clerk of Works at the College from 1948 to 1977. Tommy, a highly ranked NRA team coach at national level, accompanied and advised practices and matches at Bisley, continuing after his retirement. Credit is also due to Harvey Raker who from 1953 was SSI of Epsom CCF. No mean shot himself, Harvey was deeply involved in the many practical

details of team shooting, which allowed Tommy to focus on coaching.

The growing strength of the OERC was evident from 1973. From the 1950s onwards its members, coached and encouraged at school by Tommy and Harvey, have gone on to produce outstanding results at Bisley and as members of national teams. Many in their turn have given much back to Epsom in time spent coaching their successors. I believe the continuing success of Epsom today owes much to this commitment from members of the OERC.

In 1973, I handed over to Michael Nash, and in 1990 came Epsom's second Ashburton win. In 1978 I had become Chairman of CCRS, based at Bisley, which occupied me in retirement until 1990, when the NRA asked me to present the prizes after the Ashburton Meeting. Thus, out of the blue, I had the delightful duty of presenting the Ashburton Shield to the Epsom team – I cherish that photograph.

I have watched every Epsom team in the Ashburton from 1949 until 2010 – every one was worth it.

Building a Record of Success

MICHAEL NASH MASTER IN CHARGE OF SHOOTING 1973-95

s a cadet at The Mercers' School, I first learnt the ropes of shooting in a draughty roof-range atop the Prudential Building in High Holborn. A decade or so later, and taken on board by Epsom College in 1964, I initially helped more with CCF activities, camps and adventurous training, than on the range. Shooting was securely in the hands of Rex Goddard, and I recall Harvey Raker's support and the prominence of the OEs.

I was delighted that Rex was duly rewarded for his work with that first Ashburton win on his retirement in 1973, and I assumed responsibility for the sport from then on, assisted by Tommy Thomas. Those were the days of Easter camps at Bisley, staying at the Middlesex R.C., of 'Pokey Drill' with No 4

rifles, and copious help provided by OEs including Jeremy Hakim, John Bellringer and the ever-present Peter Dodd.

An early highlight in the Ashburton was in 1977, and our near-miss of a second victory under the captaincy of Tim Wombwell. A feeling remained that we hadn't got the method quite right. Cue George Arnold, stepping in as a coach and especially as guru for our all-important junior shooters. With his calm manner and advice, George was an important building block towards our future success. The 'Epsom Method' should not perhaps be committed to paper, but let us consider: the importance of the resurrected Lee Trophy competition, which involved everyone; the use of Initials to enhance kudos; the long hours spent in the small-bore range by staff and pupils - always directing our effort towards one specific competition goal or another.

Transport to Bisley was by a variety of

means, including a coach, which usually had an intact windscreen, and there we were regularly welcomed by OEs and others to help out. Here is my chance to record my indebtedness to Roger Gill, who arrived in 1986 as a fellow Head of Department, keen to provide whatever support he could. We remember George in charge of the Pairs and Dom Harvey keeping a close eye on the VIII. These were also years when, in addition to Athelings successes, we began staying on for the Main Meeting. And so, under Tom Erskine in 1990, we were to achieve that second Ashburton victory, leading to a further four consecutive wins, five in total from 1990 to 1994, an alltime record. I regretted not being able to

attend the event generously hosted by Lord Ashburton to celebrate the 1993 victory.

I remain enormously grateful to all who taught me what I know about shooting, at what seemed to be just the right time. A source of some satisfaction is that my final year marked the beginning of a trend for members of the VIII, who, like lames Lothian, went on to become teacher i/c shooting in other distinguished schools. I would finally like to acknowledge the wisdom of Tony Beadles in making the bold decision to advertise specifically for a Master played an Shooting, as my successor important part in continuing the tradition of success.



To celebrate the fourth consecutive victory in the Ashburton Shield competition in 1993, the 1st VIII had the privilege of meeting Lord Ashburton at Britannic House, Finsbury Circus in March 1994. Lord Ashburton proved an excellent host, not only through his own distinction as a Knight of the Garter, and Chairman of The British Petroleum Co plc, but also because of his personal interest in the sport of shooting. In his days at Eton, he had captained the Rifle Shooting team and competed in the Schools' Meeting.

This photograph records the presence of several notable supporters who helped Epsom College achieve distinction in shooting, including: Headmaster, Tony Beadles (Forest 1954-59), Col. Bob MacKeith (Carr 1946-51), who was Chairman of CCRS, and Peter Dodd (Rosebery 1943-47). Also present was Denys 'Tiny' Milne (Propert 1937-44), who served as Chairman of Governors of Epsom College and had been Chief Executive of BP Oil.

5 00 words' was the instruction for my 'reflection'. My first submission disregarded this of course and so I was whipped into line by Peter M Dodd. It's not much space I bleated, how do you fit 100+ people and I3 years into one page? Well here goes...

It all started in the .22 range...hours in the range – that is where the foundation is laid. Reflections... well, I blame Postle for most of it. I feel I have a somewhat unique perspective on things, having seen the Ashburton experience as a pupil, an OE supporter, now as Teacher, and it's thanks to his careful guidance over the years.

JRWP provided a beautifully succinct review of an average year. Except for my determination to provide more opportunities for cake, little has changed in the routine. I hold firmly to the adage, 'if it ain't broke, don't fix it' and arriving on the back of a daunting run of high-level achievements meant that I

severely doubted anything required fixing. It also made my first Ashburton day as 'Teacher i/c' one of the most challenging moments I have yet faced. Carrying the weight of others' expectations can be tricky. I have encouraged the squad to set their own goals. The only demand placed on them is that they do their best, enjoy it, and remember that what will be, will be. So far, this approach seems to be working amongst increasingly stiff competition. A true team, such as the Epsom squad, has faith, trust and mutual respect for one another. What emerges at the end of an U6th year are individuals with fantastic experiences, maybe with a medal or two, but most importantly strong friendships. Many continue with the sport at university and beyond and in this way we have a growing OERC family.

Four years in, I already have many favourite memories, which predominantly involve people. The pupils of course feature strongly, but I am especially grateful to the unsung heroes of the sport: members of the OERC. The ability to call upon phenomenal senior talent is our greatest strength. The willingness of OEs to offer their time and expertise helps make us what we are. Everyone can recall that light-bulb moment when an OE pointed out something that seemed oh-so-simple to fix, yet transformed their performance. I do not have the space to recognise everyone as I would like, but they know who they are and how much they are esteemed. Their coaching, whether refining an awkward position or translating the mystery of the wind for a U4, One final thought is for my colleagues: Roger Gill, Maureen Odendaal, Bob Bonner, Mike Hampshire, Roy Burgess and more recently, Eric Huxter, all of whom are deeply committed to developing the skills our

pupils never knew they had. They will carry these experiences with them throughout their lives.

But for one colleague, this is a particularly poignant year to be having this anniversary as it is the year that the squad must, sadly, finally bid him farewell. His commitment and enthusiasm as '2 i/c' spans over 25 years – he is our true lucky charm! Roger, on behalf of Mike, James and myself, thank you. And as I am sure you will agree, that special silver shield really does look better in our trophy cabinet than anywhere else...

Reflections on the Old Epsomian Rifle Club

n leaving the College in 1967 and having enjoyed shooting at Bisley, I wanted to continue as an OE the following summer. The Club was not very active and struggled to put even a small team together.

In 1969 I took over the running of the OERC from Alan Pryor (Wilson 1956-62), who had tried to grow the Club in the previous five years. Towards the end of my eleven year tenure, we were fielding seven teams of five in the PS Vets and the NRA capped the entries to five teams only.

In that time we won, at various stages, every county competition there was and some many times. Our members provided the College with one-to-one coaching in their

practice shoots and this without doubt helped them start their run of wins in the Ashburton.

We had OEs coming back to shooting after many years and we could always rely upon the College to provide a steady stream of young OEs of the highest standard, many of whom have become shooters of national and international standing.

For my part, I later took over the British Commonwealth Rifle Club as Secretary and then worked as the National Instructor for 10 years with the Athelings. In 1999 I was appointed Commandant of the touring Athelings team, which included David Rose (Fayrer 1994-99). I also served as Commandant of the GB Under 19 Team to SA and Manager of the England Team Under 21, winning the Under 21 World Championship in 2003.

I always look forward to our Club shoots and seeing everyone striving to improve their shooting, or coming along to enjoy a weekend at Bisley.

With a healthy flow of new members coming from the College each year, the future of our Club is assured. I sincerely hope it continues to go from strength to strength and offers the College team every support possible in the years to come.


