What does the course involve?

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Performing (30%)

- A recorded public recital lasting at least eight minutes.
- The performance can be as a soloist, as part of an ensemble, or both.
- Grade 8 is considered 'more difficult' and gains extra credit.
 - Grade 7 'standard difficulty' can still access full marks
- The recording of this recital is assessed by external examiners.

Composition (30%)

- A free composition worth (20%)
- A brief assessing technique (10%)
- chorale harmonisation in the style of J S Bach

• two-part Baroque counterpoint

• arrangement of a given melody

• a remix.

• Both compositions are assessed by external examiners.

Appraising (40%)

• Two hour examination paper covers the study of set works from six compulsory areas of study:

- Vocal Music
- Instrumental Music
 - Music for Film
- Popular Music and Jazz
 - Fusions
 - New Directions
- The examination will expect the set works to be related to wider listening, and will also require some analysis of unfamiliar music.
